



The Basics of Scanning

Goal: Identify a specific crime problem

Select a broad category of crime to focus on

Identify data and information about the crime

Interrogate the data to further understand the problem




The Basics of Analysis

Goal: Use data to identify an appropriate and effective response

Why does a problem persist?

Tools to solve
the problem

Crime Triangle


⌚ Basic elements:

Crime Scripts

- A sequence of predictable events
 - Every crime has a beginning, middle, and end
- Find the repeat circumstances to identify an "intervention point"



The Basics of Response

Goal: Craft and implement an intervention that targets intervention points

Do not rush to this step before completing scanning and analysis

What has been tried in the past for this problem and with what impacts?

JSS can assist you!

How to Devise a Response

- The same response may not work every time
- Responses will differ based on crime focus
 - Group based violence
 - Location based violence
 - Crime type



The Basics of Assessment

Goal: Determine the success of the response



What are the impacts of the response?

What data do you need to collect for a meaningful assessment?

Research partner, SME, or JSS can assist with this step!

The Purpose of Assessment



What can we learn that will help me going forward?

Do you need continued problem-solving efforts?

Was your chosen response responsible for crime reduction?

Produce an assessment to learn from experiences.

Good problem-solving means calling it as it is!

Case Study

Jose De Diego
Middle School

- New school
- Age 12-15

Wynwood NET

- High Crime area
- Gang activity
- Graffiti tagging rampant

The Problem

- Multiple calls weekly of large gang fights
- School pickup area
- School dismissal times
- Safety risks

Initial Response

- Gang task force presence
 - No fights
- Broader duties
 - Field Interviews
 - Overtime
 - Arrest in area

Issue: Fights continue to occur when police not present

SARA MODEL



- Scanning
 - Incident logs
 - Interviews/observations
- Analysis
 - Patterns
 - Stakeholder insight
 - Behavioral issues
- Response
 - Structured Detention
 - Traffic Management
- Assessment
 - No further large fights

How do you Succeed?

Planning

Crime analysis: Scanning, Analysis and Assessment

- Appropriate data
- Mapping
- Analytic skills
- Avoid analysis-paralysis




